SOUTH WOODCHESTER POST OFFICE **CLOSURE - HAVE YOUR SAY**

Woodchester Parish Council was saddened and concerned by the recent announcement that the Post Office in South Woodchester is likely to close, as this may have a significant impact on many aspects of village life. We applaud and support the actions taken by our Member of Parliament, Mr David Drew, in writing to all residents with a questionnaire. Although we believe the six-week consultation period is unrealistic, we would encourage all residents of Woodchester to complete the questionnaire, and would also welcome the views of residents, either through comments on the village website at www. woodchestervillage.co.uk, or by contacting the clerk. The Parish Council is keen to assist both South Woodchester and North Woodchester post offices and shops to remain open for trade but has neither the funds nor the expertise to run a business. The Parish Council will assist in any way it can in securing any available grants and help that may become available in order to preserve the fragile infrastructure of the whole village. COUNCIL SETS PRECEPT BELOW INFLATION Woodchester Parish Council voted at its January meeting to set a precept (the money raised through council tax) of £11,000 for financial year 2008/09. This is compared to the £12,500 raised through council tax in the previous year and is a reduction of

over 13%.

WOODCHESTER DESIGN STATEMENT

A working group is putting together a draft design statement for Woodchester. Essentially this is a documented review of what's special about Woodchester and what residents like and dislike. Once adopted it will act as supplementary planning advice to Stroud District Council when taking planning decisions. Once a draft is available it will be put to the village for widespread consultation. Please keep an eye on the parish notice boards for details of how you can contribute.

HIGHWAYS

Caution signs have been placed at each end of the High Street in South Woodchester to warn drivers of children playing in the street. These were funded jointly by the Parish Council and Stroud District Council. The Parish Council is in discussion with the Stroud Safety Officer over parking and speed safety and is watching potential developments in the village in case land or funding could be made available. The new puffin crossing has been installed at Rooksmoor.

After consultation with village residents the Parish Council has decided to go ahead with the county council's proposed move to part-night street lighting. During the spring some of the street lighting in the parish will be upgraded to allow it to be switched off for a period during the night. This scheme is being

rolled out across the county and is expected to offer considerable electricity savings and reduce carbon emissions. The police will be carefully monitoring to ensure the change does not cause problems, and the scheme can be fine-tuned with individual upgraded Obviously some lights will have to be switched back to all-night operation if necessary.

CAROLS

This year's carol singing evening was a big success with up to 150 residents joining from all parts of the parish. The evening culminated with mulled wine and mince pies beside the beautiful and festive Christmas tree in front of the spectacularly illuminated Church of St Mary's. Thanks go once again to Chinnick Theatre Services for illuminating the church and to Denis Brown & Son for providing the tree. Financial support was made available by the Woodchester Street Party 2007, Woodchester Parish Council and the Cheltenham & Gloucester Rural Initiative Fund.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

The 2007 Remembrance Sunday service was a coordinated effort between the Church of St Mary's and the Parish Council. After a moving service in the church, accompanied by a bugler, there was a procession of around 50 residents to the War Memorial, where wreaths were laid in the unseasonal sunshine.

WOODCHESTER TODDLER GROUP – CAN YOU HELP?

Many thanks to all those who donated items in the blue bags scheme in November last year. The school raised a fantastic £340-00 towards the new hall. Due to the success of this scheme, we have decided to continue with it on a regular basis with 2 collections each year. The next one will be on Monday 28th April so if you have suitable items for this collection please hold on to them until then. Blue bags will again be delivered to each house in the village with further details nearer the time.

The school receives money per weight of goods collected at the rate of £300 per tonne, so the more we collect, the more we raise. Suitable items for collection are: clothing, bedding, curtains, soft toys, shoes, belts & handbags.

SCHOOLS REPORT

ST.DOMINIC'S

As I write this report we are still in the middle of stormy January weather; the field is flooded and there appears to be very little prospect of sunshine for the week. However by the time you read this report it will be well into the New Year and hopefully Spring will be on its way.

This current period after Christmas is often a period of reflection; as we think about new year resolutions it is also appropriate to review the previous year. Working in school we get used to thinking of the end of year being the summer term, but January is the time we review progress towards meeting all those targets set in September-a 'where are we now' time. Our reflection this year has been supported by our visit from OFSTED just before Christmas. Although it came as a surprise (just when we were securely in festive mode) it has confirmed to our delight that our school is flourishing! As you will be aware we work hard to cater for all our children and to ensure that the curriculum is inspiring, therefore we were delighted to read the following judgement: 'Allowing pupils to grow towards their individual potential is central to the school's ethos, and their personal development is good. Their enjoyment of school is outstanding'.

Following our inspection it was lovely to welcome the residents of Crystal Fountain Village, The Steppes and members of Woodchester Parish Council to our infant plays. These were charming occasions enjoyed by the children and audience alike. The choir also visited the Steppes to sing carols -and were spoilt with 'treats'. The Pantomime in Cheltenham was a great success and the music concert demonstrated the talent within the School. The term ended as usual with the Christingle Service which for me is the real start of Christmas. So 'where are we now' and what does the New Year hold?

Our OFSTED action is to continue working on the implementation of individual targets, to promote personalised learning -something that we are already in the process of developing and will be supported by our Assessment for Learning project.

It is brilliant to be able to look forward to 2008 with the affirmation of a good report behind us and we will be continuing to support our children with a broad, enjoyable curriculum that promotes learning and involves visits into the community and welcomes visitors into School. We have a very exciting visit planned for the summer term but as it is still a secret you will have to wait a while to find out-so watch this

DON'T MISS OUT!

If you haven't yet got your FREE copy of 'Your Essential Flood Guide' from Gloucestershire County Council, you can now pick up a copy from your local library or GP surgery

During November and December over 260,000 copies of the guide have been sent out to homes across the county as part of the county's recovery operation following the 2007 summer floods. The guide explains what happened during the emergency and provides important practical advice to help local people cope with future emergencies. It includes a 'pull-out' guide as well as advice on health, safety and insurance. Residents are advised to keep the 20 page A5 brochure somewhere safe for future use. ROAD CROSSING TO HONOUR

A pedestrian crossing, built in memory of 11-year-old Scott Cook who died in a road accident in 2005, was opened in February.

Scott's sister, Abbie performed the opening ceremony on the A46 at Rooksmoor. 'Scott's Crossing' was installed following a campaign by people that encouraged Gloucestershire Highways to carry out a feasibility study.

The crossing offers altered kerb lines, enhanced footways and better lighting. Scott's parents also took part in the ceremony along with local schoolchildren. His parents Diane and Russell said: "He was so sensitive towards others and totally unique. "We are absolutely devastated to have lost him, but we feel gifted to have been given him."
