## **CANAL PROJECT LATEST**

**Dudbridge:** As well as the damage to the bypass channel reported last month, a further problem has come to light here. Water has displaced around 100 bricks from the bottom of the canal (the 'invert'). These were not replaced during the recent refurbishment work and the cause is not clear. Meanwhile, investigations are underway to establish the exact cause of the damage to the bypass.

**Wallbridge Lower Lock:** There has been a slight delay on the start of work here; Alun Griffiths Ltd is now expected to begin setting up their site on 9<sup>th</sup> June. The delay was due to the need to get temporary Flood Defence Consent from the Environment Agency. The company will be widening and deepening the channel above the lock, before constructing a bypass to carry the flow of Slad Brook around the lock. This will include a fish and eel pass, allowing migration upstream, which is not currently possible.

Land & Water Services now expect to begin dredging below the lock in July, again once the necessary consents have been obtained from the Environment Agency. In the meantime, it is good to see that McCarthy & Stone is making good progress with the bored piled wall, necessary to retain their site overlooking the lock.

**Capels Mill:** Three temporary sculptures are currently sited IN the canal as part of the annual Stroud Site Festival. They will be joined in the next couple of weeks by the large sculpture, designed by local artist Sam Freeman, winner of the canal 'Search for a Sculptor' competition. The sculpture is now taking shape at Pangolin Editions, who have sponsored the competition to the tune of £12500. The sculpture will be sited once our volunteers have constructed the necessary 10 concrete pads high on the bank overlooking the canal and railway viaduct.

**Bowbridge:** Work on building the retaining wall below the vets' surgery is complete. Unfortunately, a section of old wharf wall above the lock on the towpath side collapsed last week; necessitating towpath closure on safety grounds. It had been noticed that the wall had no foundation and preparations were underway to rebuild it on a concrete foundation. This will still take place, but with a delay while the collapsed material is removed.

**Living Waterway Awards:** We submitted 6 award applications, with 5 shortlisted. Judging took place last week. We'll be holding our breath until September, when the winners will be announced at a ceremony in Leeds. The Living Waterway Awards replace the Waterway Renaissance Awards, in which the Cotswold Canals project has been singularly successful in the last 3 years.

## **AFFORDABLE HOUSING:** *Provide affordable, decent and social housing*

### **MOBILE HOMES ACT**

The Mobile Homes Act 2013 has introduced a number of changes, which have been implemented in stages, with the last coming into force on 1<sup>st</sup> April. Some of the changes implemented include the following:

- a seller of a park home no longer needs to seek approval of the buyer from the site owner
- new forms are to be completed if a site owner wants to increase pitch fees
- certain site rules have been banned and there are new procedures for a site owner to follow if they want to make a new site rule, which has been specified in the Mobile Homes Act (Site Rules)(England) Regulations 2014
- it has been made less onerous to prove an offence of harassment of an occupier of a park home
- it has created a new offence of providing false or misleading information to deter the purchase of a mobile home going ahead

The new legislation also brings in a duty for the Local Authority to maintain a register of the site rules for each of the caravan sites in their district. Stroud District Council will be working with the site owners in our district to collate this information over the coming months. This register will have a link on our website under Park Homes.

The final part of the new legislation came into force on 1st April 2014 and saw the implementation of further enforcement powers given to the Local Authority and also the introduction of fees & charges for the administration costs of licensing & monitoring compliance of the site license. There is a separate charge for any formal enforcement action taken. Please see SDC website under Park Homes for more information with the new fees policy and register on line.

## **PLANNING NEWS**

### **Baxter's Field Summer Street Stroud**

At the time of writing, the appeal into 112 houses at Summer Street is in its second week. Defence from the Council relate to landscape and heritage matters. Local residents have added drainage and highways which the County Council and Environment Agency do not wish to defend. The Developer argues that the harm to landscape and heritage have been over stated and was not harmed by the development. The Inspector is due to consider his decision next week after 8 full days of debate.

### **Local Plan Examination in Public**

As we go to press, we await the interim report of the planning inspector on the local plan inquiry. Mr Pratt adjourned the inquiry nearly two months ago to consider the Duty to Co-operate, housing numbers and employment issues.

The interim report is due to be sent to the Council on or around the 2<sup>nd</sup> June and will appear on the inquiry website. Copies will be sent to all members and parish councils as soon as practicable.

### **Planning appeals decided:**

Land South of **Larksfield Road** Kingscourt - S.13/2009/FUL APPEAL DISMISSED The appeal is made by Alltimes Homes Limited and consisted of the erection of three new dwellings.

**6A Tilsdown** Cam - S.12/0275/UNLB SPLIT DECISION appeal against an enforcement notice and listed building refusal. The building had been modified and rendered without consent. The inspector accepted that the damage was irreversible and whilst upholding the enforcement notice, made a number of changes to allow parts to be overclad with brick slips.

Land adjacent to Armada Cottage **Butterrow Hill** - APPEAL DISMISSED The appeal was made by Mr Roger Dean for development of a new dwelling. The appeal was dismissed on the grounds that the proposal would result in significant harm to the character and appearance of the surrounding area

Land South of **Cirencester Road**, East of Minchinhampton - APPEAL DISMISSED The appeal is made by Mr & Mrs Alltimes for the erection of one dwelling. In dismissing the appeal the inspector concluded "I take the view that the site's relatively accessible location does not outweigh the harm identified above in respect to the overall effect on the character and appearance of the area and the Cotswold AONB"

## **NEIGHBOURHOOD WARDEN NEWS**

### **Wardens Mop Up Illegal Fly Posters**

Neighbourhood Wardens recently removed over 50 illegal fly posters' advertising a local musical event. The posters were erected without prior consent of the landowner, blighted the local landscape as well as causing a road safety issue. Following the immediate removal of the posters, the event organisers were contacted and appropriate advice given.

### **Neighbourhood Wardens Help the Vulnerable**

Following a recent referral for assistance, Wardens helped an elderly gentleman to complete an Attendance Allowance form due to their mental and physical health issues. As a result, the gentleman was successfully awarded the allowance, able to afford to have his home cleaned and no longer at risk of being evicted by his landlord.

### **Deer Laid to Rest**

Wardens received a complaint about 3 deer found dead in an open air swimming pool; several people were asked assist with this health hazard but with no joy. Neighbourhood Wardens intervened and arranged the drainage of the pool, removal of the deer and subsequent incineration. The owner was also persuaded to cap the pool to avoid any repeat incident.

### **Neighbourhood Wardens provide a 'wheelie' good service.**

Neighbourhood Wardens visited an elderly couple to find that their green wheelie bin had been contaminated with the wrong materials. Wardens removed the contaminants, ordered a new green recycling tub and provided the couple with information explaining Stroud District Council's recycling scheme.

### **Safe Haven**

Wardens have been assisting the Keep Safe scheme in their areas, by getting local businesses to sign up to the initiative. The scheme will benefit vulnerable residents with learning and physical disabilities. [www.keepsafeglos.org](http://www.keepsafeglos.org)

### **Caring and Sharing**

Neighbourhood Wardens were lucky enough to be invited to a Carers Forum held at Old Town Hall, Stroud. There were over 40 organisations promoting care services and over 50 Carers attended. Wardens assisted by providing community safety and crime prevention information.

### **Safer Parking for Schools**

Following complaints about parents parking on double yellow lines and on dropped kerbs when dropping children off to school, the local Warden visited the site and provided advice to parents. In addition security advice was also provided to one parent who had left their vehicle insecure with keys in the ignition and a purse on the front seat.

## **YOUTH COUNCIL NEWS**

### **SDYC working with Healthwatch Gloucestershire**

Members of Stroud District Youth Council have begun working with Healthwatch Gloucestershire to explore issues affecting young people. Following an initial presentation from Healthwatch Glos' earlier this year, the youth council's Health Focus Group are now engaging in talks with the county's new consumer champion for health and social care in England. Topics of particular attention are sexual health and mental wellbeing. Consultation carried out last year led to these two huge issues being targeted by the youth council for greater attention. Complimenting these initial efforts and in additional response to young people being acknowledged as needing a greater voice in health and social care, is the consideration of Youth Health Champions coming from the focus group.

## **New Youth Centre Opens in Stonehouse**

In response to the huge need highlighted by young people in Stonehouse a few years ago, a new youth centre recently opened alongside the new skate park at the recreation area off Oldends Lane. The local youth forum, Stonehouse Action 4 Youth (SA4Y) led the active involvement of young people on this project, working closely with adult stakeholders including the Town Council. Facilitated by district council youth workers, SA4Y have been consistently involved throughout the fund raising efforts, planning and design process, as well as making decisions on the internal layout and colour schemes. At the grand opening event of both facilities, Millie Jotham (SDYC Leader & Member of SA4Y) addressed the crowd of people of all ages and said; *“Thanks must go to all those involved creating this new youth centre...it has been a great achievement involving lots of hard work and one that I’m very proud to have been involved with as a member of Stonehouse Action 4 Youth”*. SA4Y will continue to work on other youth issues in the town and surrounding area.

## **BE SHED SECURE**

Many people go to a great deal of trouble to secure their homes and property but at the same time overlook the valuable equipment in sheds, outbuildings and outside storage, which are either unlocked or not fit for purpose - proving no obstacle to a thief. Thefts from sheds and outbuildings have been occurring in the Stroud area recently:

- Secure the access to your shed or garage by locking gates and
- Using obstacles such as trellis or prickly bushes next to walls and fences
- Visibly mark the contents of your shed - make a note of serial numbers and photograph any valuables
- Use external security lights that are activated by movement - as a deterrent
- Ensure shed doors are locked and windows are secure - use a strong padlock, such as a closed shackle padlock on the door  
Use coach bolts or non-return screws to strengthen door hinges and locks or grilles on windows.
- Chain cycles, mowers, ladders and tools to a strong anchorage point
- Alarm your property - small alarms for sheds and garages are available at most DIY stores
- Check that your household policy covers you for theft from your garden or outbuildings. If not make sure you have the right cover

## **HR UPDATE**

### **Flexible working**

New legislation comes into effect on 30<sup>th</sup> June to extend the right to request flexible working. The changes will be incorporated into our Employee Handbook section 2.3 – Family Friendly Policies – before the new law comes into effect, but here are the key points:

1. **Everyone** can now submit a formal request for flexible working once in any twelve-month period.
2. **Any reason or none** can be given for requesting flexible working.
3. **Reasonable consideration** has to be given to the request. We no longer have to justify any refusal along narrow grounds but can consider the bigger picture. However, we will still operate on the assumption that unless there is a clear reason to refuse, requests will be granted.

### **Personal use of social media**

There is a new policy on the personal use of social media both in and out of work. When it comes to browsing or posting to personal social media accounts in work time, it should come as no surprise that time spent not doing work ought to be recorded as such! When it comes to out-of-work time, the policy reminds everyone that they don't stop being an SDC employee after five o'clock and offers some general guidance on where the line sits and how to avoid crossing it.
